The Urgent Need To Establish Project Management Program

Project management - a skill that is in great demand

It is logical to assume that the needs of any economy dictate the ebb and flow of careers. In a growing economy like India, the thrust is on developmental, nation building projects. The new government has announced several ambitious new projects like 'Make in India', in addition to a number of ongoing infrastructure projects including launch of Metro Rail in all the major cities, power plants, dams, seamless national highways, the Delhi - Mumbai Industrial Corridor and many more. The IT industry as well functions on a 'projectized' basis. Even for social projects to be successful, project management skills are absolutely essential.

Today, project management ranks as the third most in-demand skill behind

leadership and business analysis. Nearly one fifth (1/5) of the world's GDP (USD 12 trillion) is being spent on projects annually. And, project

management has been identified as the primary factor behind successful projects be it global businesses, governments or NGOs. This scenario conveys that the global economy itself has made a fundamental shift to a project-driven system. Not surprisingly, the world-wide demand for skilled project managers has been steadily growing over the last decade. In India too, with the thrust given by the government on developmental projects, the demand for project managers is expected to rise rapidly.

An Anderson Economic Group survey reveals that project management is now used in more than 85 occupations, across a wide range of industries. Virtually every industry needs project managers. Be it a self-employed businessman, an event manager, an entrepreneur, a finance expert, IT professional, an engineer – across all sectors, project management skills are extremely valuable.

However, while the demand for skilled project managers has risen meteorically, there are not enough qualified project professionals to meet this demand. The widening gap between the supply and demand for skilled project managers is projected to

reach crisis proportions with as much as USD 4.5 trillion of the global GDP at risk. Statistics reveal that out of 51 million people participating in projects worldwide just one million have professionally recognized formal project management training.

While these statistics reveal the widening gap between the

supply and demand for project managers globally, the scenario in India is even more alarming. Our country is projected to require 400,000 project professionals every year until 2020. Hence the promulgation of project management education in India has assumed great significance considering the position in which India finds herself in this millennium. It is imperative that academic institutions in India understand the urgency of this need and introduce project management as part of their curriculum.

Academia must rise as one, to meet this urgent need

"The potential for crisis becomes even more apparent considering the fact that educational institutions are not graduating enough project professionals to fill the increased demand for the discipline," says Raj Kalady, Country Director – India, Project Management Institute.

Although thousands of engineering and business programs exist in India, they have not yet included project management into their curriculum. These colleges are missing out on grooming the next generation of business leaders. Unlike narrowly focused fields such as finance or IT, project management encompasses an array of skill sets spanning - planning, budgeting, controlling, communication, risk management, finance and other areas.

In fact, the survey reveals that in India median salaries of project managers is over Rs. 16,00,000 p.a.. The prospects are truly amazing.
